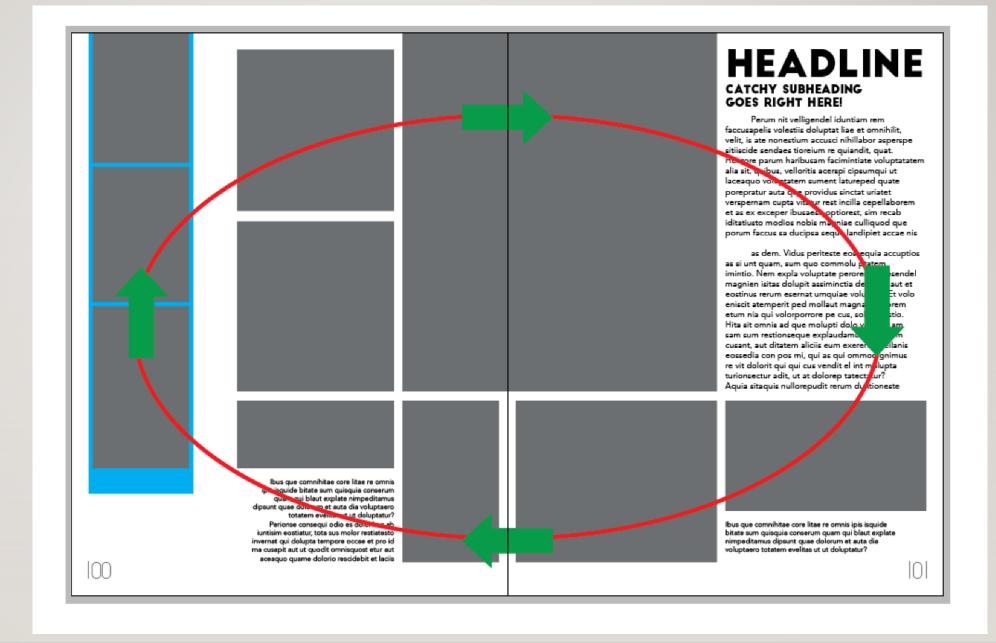

WHAT IS A LAYOUT (OR SPREAD)?

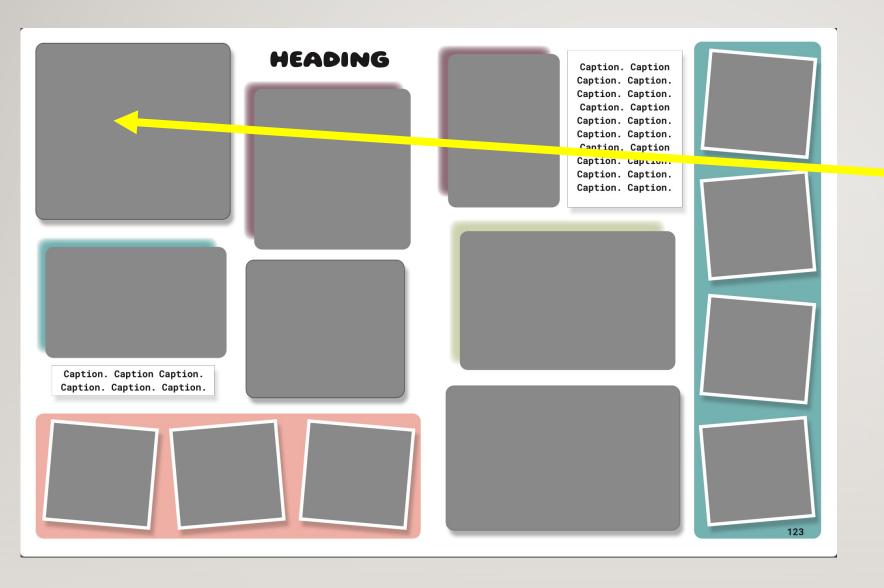
- Layouts are the display of information and elements across 2 pages.
- Layouts contain a theme that works with the content/information that is displayed.
- You often find layouts in books, magazines, flyers, ePublications, etc.
- The goal of a layout is to convey information in an engaging, easy-to-follow manner.

The Visual Flow of a Layout



THE ELEMENTS

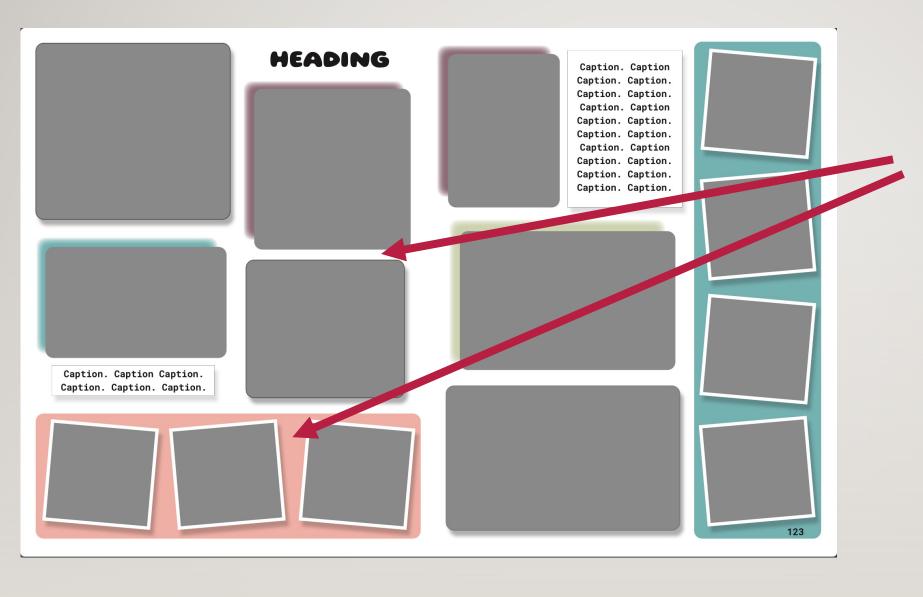
- All layouts, regardless of publication, contain the same set of elements.
- These elements work accomplish two things I) keep content organized and 2) engage and maintain the reader/audience.
- In short, the elements are:
 - Dominate image
 - Supporting or reference photos
 - Heading
 - Subheading and Captions
 - Body Copy
 - White Space
 - Graphic Elements



Dominate Photo

This is the point of entry for the audience.

Usually, this photo is 2.5x bigger than the other photos in the spread.

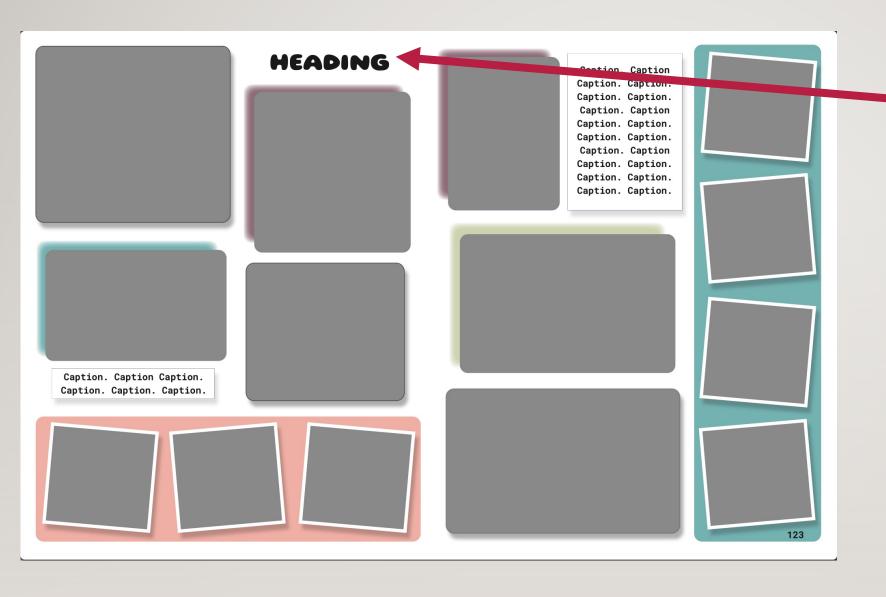


Supporting or Reference Photos

The additional photos in the layout.

Can vary in size.

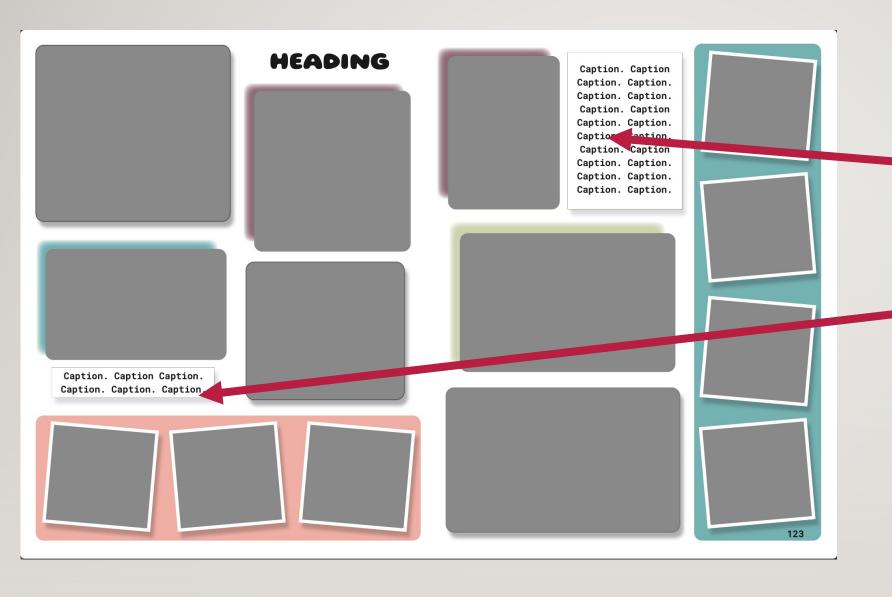
Help to maintain the theme and story of the layout.



Heading

The title or largest text on the spread.

Usually, short and not an entire sentence.



Subheadings and Captions

Smaller text that is no bigger than one sentence.

Quotes or statements.



sub headlin

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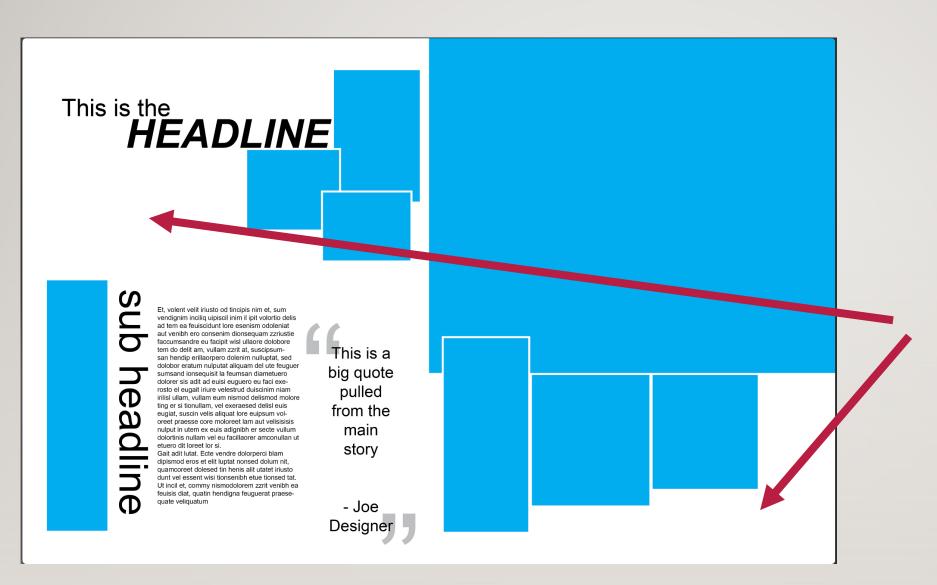
This is a big quote pulled from the main story

- Joe Designer **Body Copy**

Smallest text.

Longer writing.
Paragraphs,
explanations, stories,
etc.

Spreads can have multiple body copy sections or none.

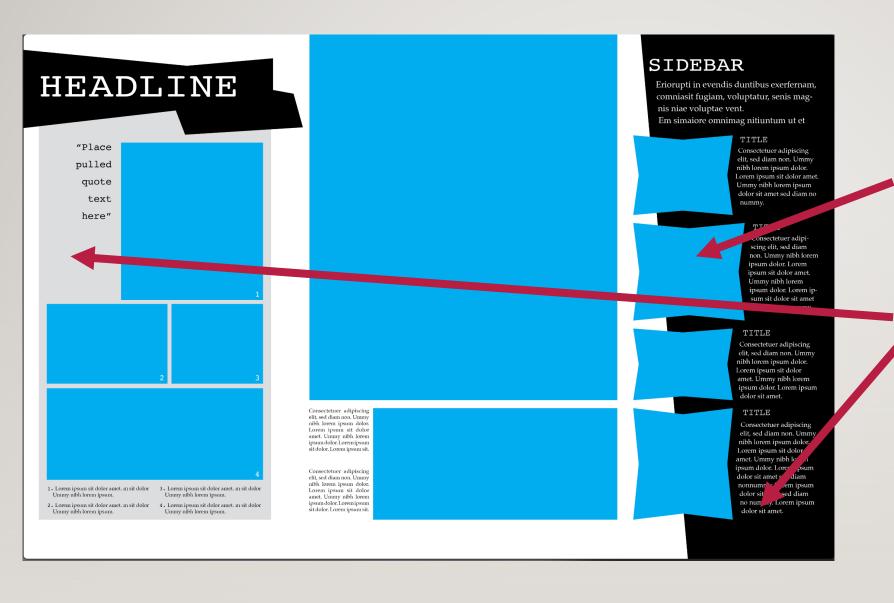


White Space

Margins, borders.

Can be intentional based on how you space you other elements.

Best to avoid having larger areas of white space in the middle of the spread.



Graphic Elements

Background, colours, shapes, decorations, etc.

These help to keep continuity with the theme of the layout.

Also add visual character to help with maintaining interest.

CONCLUSION

- Layouts (or Spreads) are a way to organize content in an engaging manner.
- All layouts, regardless of content and medium, contain a key set of elements.
- Depending on your style or plan, creating a layout will require these key elements to varying degrees.
